Purpose of the National Post-School Access Community of Practice


The aim of this community of practice is to share knowledge about post-school opportunities and pathways for South Africa's youth from a range of different perspectives, and to facilitate interaction between diverse players in this sector.

The Post-School Landscape

The post-school landscape covers a broad spectrum from institutional education and training to workplace learning and informal skills acquisition. It includes issues of access and factors affecting performance as well as ways of enhancing employability to facilitate the transition of young people into employment, self-employment or entrepreneurship.

Post-School Access CoP participants

The CoP attracts participants from a broad range of organisations, who connect over their shared interest and work in supporting young people to navigate the post-school terrain and ultimately the world-of-work.



History of the P-SA CoP

This community of practice began in 2012 as the Tertiary Access Focus Group, an action group set up by higher education bursary providers to explore their common interests. It subsequently evolved into a community with a wider focus on the post-school terrain in general.





What happens in a P-SA CoP meeting?

The CoP holds four meetings a year. These events might include:

- Expert input on aspects of the Post-School Access landscape
- Showcasing organisations or innovations
- Panel discussions
- Group activities on specific topics
- Hands-on exploration of resources or practices
- Discussion of links between policy and on-the-ground realities and practices
- Updates and information-sharing on key events or issues in the Post-School Access landscape
- Formation of specific interest groups or task teams to pursue a line of action

Examples of themes, topics and tools explored by the P-SA CoP

- Sharing of information and collaboration around bursary opportunities
- Issues of TVET colleges, work integrated learning, and the value of industry/ TVET partnerships in strengthening the curriculum and enhancing student employability
- Insights into the development of the National Plan for Post-School Education and Training (NP-PSET), for implementing an integrated post-school system
- The implications of the Fourth Industrial Revolution for education and skills development

- The Demand-Driven Training (DDT) Toolkit, a digital resource that helps bridge gaps between education and employment
- The work of the DHET's Career Development Services in providing effective career information and counselling
- The Maharishi Institute's success in empowering young people by giving them access to quality business education while developing them as 'whole people'.

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The challenge – and the opportunity – that this CoP gives us is a chance to ask: What can we do jointly if we engage with others in the room, that we couldn't do on our own?
